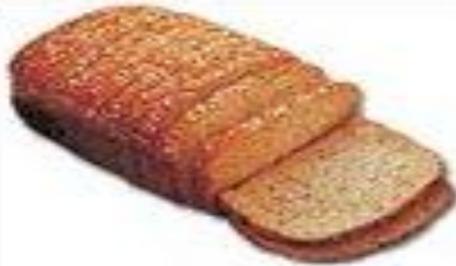
Abstract

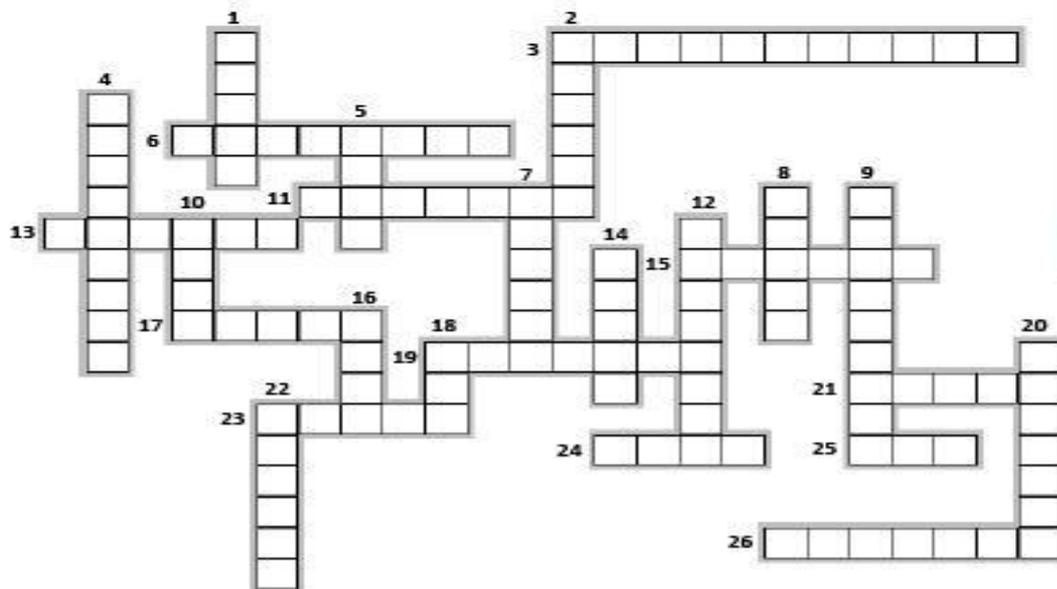

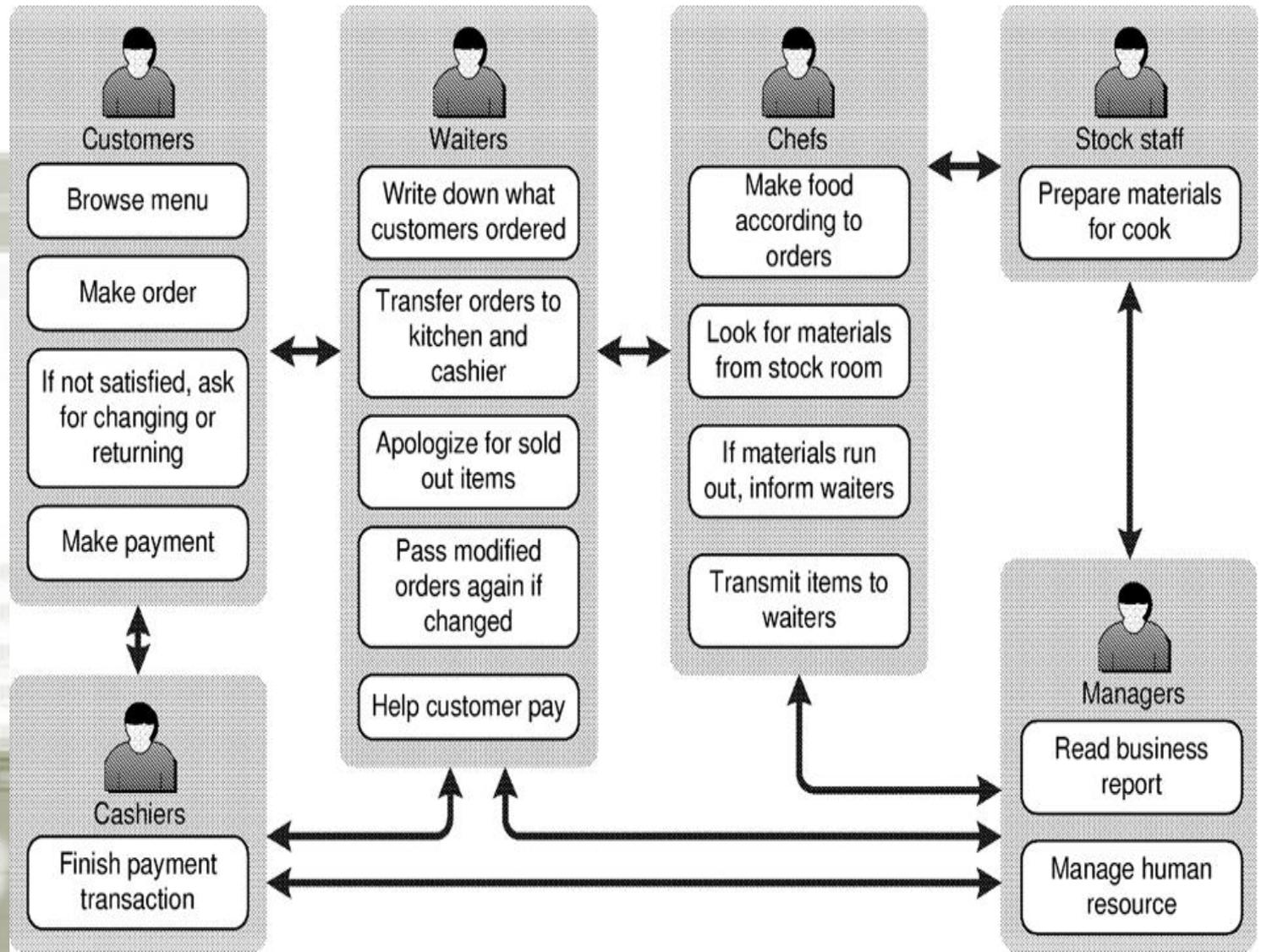

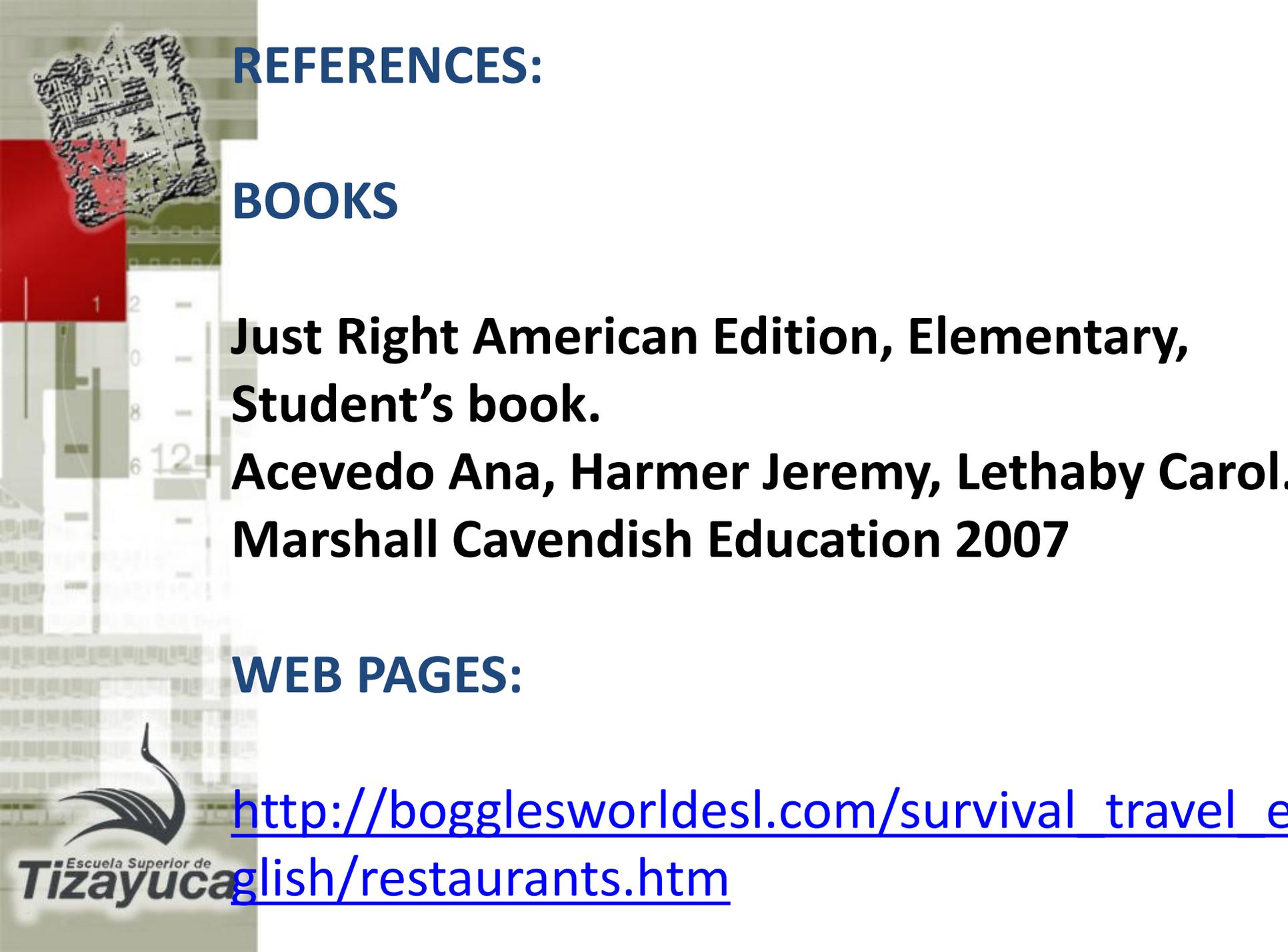
